



We go eat, talk story, li'dat!





Haunted Hawaii Ghost Stories

Only during the month of October, do we open the village at night for tours. We offer a special night tour entitled "Haunted Hawaii Ghost Stories." Executive Director **Jeffrey Higa** starts the tour by leading listeners through the village, recounting true stories of the supernatural happenings, sightings, and encounters that have occurred in the Village. You will hear of unexplained phenomena, spiritual investigations, and even murders and killings that have formed the lore of this area. Later, listeners end up at the *halau wa'a*, where storyteller and longtime Waipahu resident, **Moira Nakamine**, recounts tales of paranormal events and local legends she learned growing up in the Waipahu area.
